

Well, not exactly. My parents are from India, but I was born here. I'm a Nottingham native, just like my husband. His name is Charles, or Chaz for short, and we have six-year-old twins, Jan and Jill. We also have two dogs and a cat.

What part of Nottingham do you live in?

We live in Hockley now. We moved there in 2001 when we got married. It's quite a trendy area. There are lots of boutiques and expensive bars and restaurants, which means there's a lot of traffic and it's very noisy in the evenings. So it's not great if you have young children. But we like where we live. It's a nice terraced house and there's a park about half a mile away. My kids love it.


